One can look up on archive.org what these sites were – they provided alternative information (NOT disinformation as some would strive to have you believe), and nothing else.

So what would happen to a site that downloaded WP from WordPress.org and had similar alternative info?

At the moment I am telling all my clients not to use WordPress or get off WordPress (I have numerous clients whom I have done this with). So clarity on this censorship point is required.

people to use WordPress software for any reason they want, without any enforcement over legality or illegality. We leave that up to the webhosts. In cases of theft, abuse, harassment, or other such behavior, your best recourse is to contact their web host directly. You can use WHOIS to determine where they're hosted, as well as resources like https://www.whoishostingthis.com to find relevant information.

Also note that your site was hosted at wordpress.com. That's a separate company –a *hosting* company — not wordpress.org.

Yes, of course, they can and do. One of the most obvious examples is it doesn't allow porn. You'll find that is the case for a lot of hosting services, they limit content on their systems. I wouldn't call it "censorship", but yes, they do that.

On sites that are private (independent of WordPress.com, in that sites are not hosted there) but use the WordPress software (downloaded from Wordpres.org) there is absolutely NO censorship of content?

Nope. The WordPress software is free for any use whatsoever. We don't have the ability to "censor" or otherwise block content. But you don't have to take our word for it. The WordPress software is open source, and free to read, use, even modify. You can read the source code and see for yourself that we don't have that ability.
